Last time Ashorne and Newbold Pacey celebrated the crowning of a monarch, in 1953, things were very different from the recent much enjoyed celebration for the Coronation of King Charles III.'

'The Warwick Advertiser' reported on Friday May 11 1953 *"Villages are ready for Coronation Day* A continuous round of feasting, dancing and gaiety.

Most villages in the neighbourhood of Warwick have now completed their arrangements for Coronation celebrations and are prepared for a day of feasting, dancing and fun. The necessary funds have been raised during the winter by all manner of communal activities and June 2 promises to be for hundreds of counry dwellers a memorable round of activities in which all classes will join with a will. Having raised £80 10shillings, (£80.50) thereby overshooting its target by 15 shillings (75p) Newbold Pacey and Ashorne have compiled the following programme:"
