Well! I for one am glad the heatwave has gone. Sorry if you were a fan of the hot weather. It took its toll on wildlife. Bumble Bees stop flying when the temperature rises to around 30C. Not surprising with a fur coat on. Honey Bees cope better but hive communities can suffer. Wild flowers and even nettles can wilt and get scorched. Caterpillars may then die, so less for the birds to eat and less pollinating for the Bumbles.

Badgers and **Hedgehogs** (not the best of friends) suffer with the soil being baked. Worms dig further down to escape the heat and find moisture so less food and dangerously less wateravailable. Whenever there's a hot or even a warm spell, if you put out a shallow dish of water and

## **Farewell to Village Stalwart Pat**

St George's was packed as many of friends and family members gathered for a moving ceremony to say goodbye to PAT TARVER, who died aged 90 on July 19th, having been at the heart of village life for over 70 years.

#### Sally Jones has written this tribute which really sums up why Pat will be so very missed.

After working as a carpet weaver in Warwick as a young woman, she did a variety of jobs at Warwick School for nearly three decades - but volunteering was her real passion.

With her much-loved husband John, Pat gave decades of unstinting service to the church, on the flower and cleaning rotas, helping care for the churchyard, organising the fete and raising thousands for church funds in her inimitable style. Her forceful technique for selling raffle tickets was legendary and few escaped without being 'persuaded' to buy a strip. She also supported numerous charities, particularly the RNLI and the Warwickshire Air Ambulance, the joint-recipients of the donations at her funeral.

An enthusiastic WI member and accomplished needlewoman, she knitted scores of exquisite Nativity scenes, many now proudly displayed in the parish and around the world. For much of her life, she helped to organise "everything that moved", according to one friend, founding the Ashorne Youth Club which generations of local children enjoyed, selling vast numbers of poppies for Remembrance Day, and baby-sitting many children in the district.

She made the Ashorne Cricket Club match teas for years and was overjoyed to be given Life Membership for her loyalty to the club. A deeply patriotic royalist, she delighted in decorating her cottage with bunting for every big occasion, from jubilees and anniversaries to weddings and christenings, and she made the nearby old telephone box a shrine to her favourite royals. She was astonished when the WI and local villagers threw a surprise 90th birthday party for her at the Church last summer, in alorious sunshine.

Her longstanding friend Krys Pietrecki affectionately remembered her great generosity, outspoken, quirky character and determination bordering on stubbornness. It was this that enabled Pat, with care and support from her devoted neiahbours

living at picturesque Park Cottage until a couple of weeks before her death. Thanks to such loving support, she survived potentially lethal tumbles into her garden pond and hazardous journeys, hauling herself upstairs on her hands and knees to fetch crucial items from her bedroom and then denying she had made the illicit climb. Only the bathroom light left on revealed the truth.

During her final few days, her friend Pam Cook who was organising the St George's Flower Festival, created 'Park Cottage', a dainty, tea party-themed window arrangement in her honour and Pat smilingly admired a photo of the display from her hospital bed.

At her wake in the Village Hall, the reminiscences continued with friends and family taking comfort from the thought that Pat was now reunited with her beloved John. Our thoughts and prayers are with their extended family.
